Manager's Message



The 1940 Census!!

With the anticipation 72 years of waiting can bring, we celebrate the opening of the 1940 United States Federal Population Census! In a first for the United States National Archives and Records Administration, the nation's record keeper plans to post the entire census on the Internet — its biggest digitization effort to date.

The Census is not indexed

Finding a name in the 3.8 million digitized images won't be as easy as a Google search. It could be at least six months after the release before a nationwide name index is created. In the meantime, researchers will need an address to determine a census enumeration district — a division of geographic areas — to identify where someone lived and then browse the records. Do not despair. Although indexes do not exist at present, there are ways to find your parents, grandparents, or other ancestors.

Steve Morse has created an enumeration district finder in which you use street names to narrow down the location where your family lived. <http://www.stevemorse.org/census/unified.html>. If you have a rural ancestor, browsing the census images by county might be enough, but the Steve Morse website also has the ability to narrow your search down to the ED's of a particular town or village. Try the easy-to-navigate tutorial from the main census page on the site to pinpoint the ED's you will need to browse: <http://www.stevemorse.org/census/>.

Help index the Census

As mentioned, the census is being released without being indexed. Indexes are, of course, a great help in finding names in the census or any other genealogical resource. You can help create an index for this wonderful resource. To help index the census, you will use the FamilySearch.org indexing software, which you download directly to your computer. The strength of the genealogical community can bind together to make sure that by the end of 2012 the entire 1940 census has been indexed.

Visit <http://the1940census.com> for information about the indexing project and to sign up to help! It is a wonderful way to give back and help all our fellow researchers. Who knows, you might even index your own family!!!

I would like to encourage all of you to: 1) sign up for 1940 census indexing, 2) sign up as a member of the Texas State Genealogical Society. (Clayton Library Friends is a member of TSGS.) You can do that when you set your account by choosing that option in your preferences. Or it might be that you are signed up to support your local society. That is great too. The most important thing is that we are indexing the 1940 census.

Volunteer Corner

At Clayton Library, the staff is very blessed to have a strong support group in the Clayton Library Friends, and a strong volunteer base to call upon when needed. As our staff size continues to shrink with budget cuts, we increasingly turn to partnerships with volunteers to run some of the day-to-day operations of the library. Every day of the week Volunteers are playing leading roles in shelving books and manning the welcome desk at the Clayton House.

Our newest partnership with volunteers involves the 2nd floor microprint desk. The team of Vanessa Smith, Karen Acker, Charlene Wilson (all former Clayton Library staff), Liz Hicks, and Marjorie Lowe, has combined forces to help provide open-to-close volunteer coverage of the microprint desk on Saturdays. Saturday is both our busiest day of the week and our shortest-staffed day of the week. So, having the help of these highly-knowledgeable genealogy experts allows the staff to provide better customer service to our patrons on the 1st floor, as well as to

effectively manage the many programs and activities that we currently run on Saturdays. These microprint desk volunteers will work directly with patrons to understand and interpret their genealogical records, navigate the microprint finding aids, explore the family history books, and utilize the microprint machines. We greatly appreciate the help of these and all of our volunteers!

Over time, we hope to create more such partnerships with our volunteer base. Part of the excitement of genealogy is the social factor, when researchers come to the library and share with one another their findings and notes. I firmly believe that an active volunteer base contributes greatly to the social environment of our library, and helps to keep our genealogical community buzzing with excitement!

RESEARCHING IMMIGRANTS FROM THE LAND OF THE MIDNIGHT SUN AT CLAYTON LIBRARY

Blaine Hedberg, executive director of the Norwegian American Genealogical Center and Naeseth Library, spoke at a special seminar given by the Clayton Library Friends after the general meeting on Saturday, February 11, 2012. The seminar was held in the Clayton carriage house which was full of researchers coming to learn more about how to research their Norwegian roots. There were people present from as far away as Brazos County, and a representative from the Royal Norwegian Consulate in Houston was in attendance.

Hedberg's presentation acquainted the researchers with the Norwegian and Norwegian-American resources available at the center in Madison, Wisconsin, and also emphasized the unique databases being developed for Norwegian American genealogical research and what would be available online and at Clayton Library. He also distributed a handout listing specific books as excellent tools in researching American ancestors that were either Norwegian immigrants or descendants of those immigrants.

Norway, according to Hedberg, is unique in that hundreds of rural communities have published local histories containing general history of the community, farm history, genealogy of the residents which may go back as far as 1600, and usually an index to all of the personal names in the volume or sometimes an index of the farm names in the volume. There are approximately 2,800 of these books; currently Clayton Library has a small collection of them. Two of the important resources for Norwegian genealogical research are the census and the church records. For those unfamiliar with the Norwegian language, both of these may be difficult to use. The farm and family books give the best genealogical summaries available, but as in any research, it is important to verify what is in the books with the primary source records. At present the Clayton Library only owns a few of these books.

Clayton does have an outstanding collection of books on Norwegian immigrants to the United States. A bibliography follows this article with call numbers. One of the outstanding results of this visit was Hedberg's telling us of a book published in 1982 called *Norge i Texas*. It is a large, 500+ page book which sold out right after its initial printing and was not available again. This sounded like a book that would be very valuable to Texas researchers at Clayton Library, so the Clayton Library Friends Acquisitions Committee set out on a search for it. It was not available at any of the many used and hard-to-find book offerings on the internet. According to OCLC, only three copies are in Texas libraries: the University of Texas in Austin, Baylor University, and Waco-McLennan public library.

But the good news is that, looking through used book dealers in Europe, the Acquisitions Committee was able to find a good copy of the book for a very nominal price!! A representative from the Norwegian consulate was expecting a visitor from Oslo in April. So to avoid the high freight costs, the book was delivered to the person's home in Oslo, brought to Houston via airplane, and is now at HPL for cataloging. So Clayton Library will now have this important resource!!

The Acquisitions Committee is also reaching out to the Norwegian community in Texas for donations of other materials and monetary donations for purchases of Norwegian materials. The consular representative advised us that the Norwegian community in Texas is over 6,000 people, and is among the largest in the United States. So we hope to find more of the "farm" books and other materials for use.

Gifts in Kind –

Gifts of microfilm, microfiche, and books given to Clayton Library are called “Gifts in Kind”. As an important source of contributions to Clayton Library, filling in the Gift Receipt (sample below) correctly and completely can make your gift more valuable to both Clayton Library and Clayton Library Friends. Both groups keep records concerning the donation of these gifts.

Bring your donations to the Information Desk of the main library building. There you will complete a Gift Receipt form like the one shown below. Some of the blanks are self-explanatory. Be sure to check the box indicating that the gift is through Clayton Library Friends. ‘In honor of’ indicates that the item is being donated in honor of a living person. ‘In memory of’ is used in memory of a deceased person.

The most difficult portion of the form seems to be the ‘Donor’s total evaluation for gifts donated through CLF’. If the donation is a periodical, the evaluation is the subscription or amount of dues paid in order to receive

the periodical at that time. If the item is a book, microfilm, or microfiche, the value usually is the original asking price. In general, genealogical materials do not increase in value.

Clayton Library can utilize your donations in a number of ways – even if it is a duplicate of our current library holdings. If it is in better shape than an existing item, it might be substituted for that item. Or, it may be added to our collection of duplicates that we offer to other libraries and institutions to trade for items that Clayton wants but does not have. If we have a number of copies of an item or it is an older edition, we may put it on the ‘sale’ table opposite the Information Desk – with the money being used for the library.

Please remember to ask for a Gift Receipt when you bring your donations into the Library. It’s another way we can help the library staff. Thank you for the donations – both Gifts in Kind and monetary.

Clayton Library Friends turns 25 –

Clayton Library Friends celebrates their 25th anniversary this year. During the year, we will have a series of articles in the CLF newsletter chronicling some of the highlights of the organization. The February 2012 issue contained Part I – Starting out... which documented some highlights of organizing CLF and the new library building.

Part II – The middle years ...

For several years before 1994, the year we hosted the National Genealogical Society (NGS) in Houston, we spent many long hours planning for the event. By all reports, it was a success and all those involved breathed a sigh of relief when it was over.

One of our early concerns, as we planned for the influx of NGS researchers, was the August 1991 HPL reports of ‘financial malnutrition’ in their budget. It seems to be a recurring problem. The July 2003 newsletter reports that “Clayton staff is down to fourteen”. [In April 2012 the Library staff now numbers 8.] But April 2002 was the threat that worried Clayton Library Friends. The Houston City Council planned to make drastic cuts in the HPL budget, bringing rumors of reduction of Clayton staff, reduction of library hours, etc. CLF sprang into action – speaking at City Council meetings, conducting City Councilmen on tours of Clayton Library, and introducing them individually to what genealogy really was and how important the library and its services were to the general population of Houston. In July 2002, Clayton Library Friends made a commitment to the City “that CLF volunteers would man non-reference librarian positions to ease the intractable insistence of the HPL administration to shut Clayton.” To this day, we continue to fully man the Welcome Desk at the Clayton House, and to provide many other valuable volunteer services to ‘our’ library.

In April 1998 the president of the National Genealogical Society advised us that *The CLF Newsletter* had been selected as the first place winner of the 1997 NGS Newsletter Competition in the category of Major Genealogical Societies. In 2001 CLF (Don Pusch, editor) entered the NGS Newsletter Competition for a second time. This time we were awarded ‘Honorable Mention’ in the Major Genealogical and/or Historical Societies Category of the National

Genealogical Society 2001 Newsletter Competition – receiving 274 points out of a possible 300.

Until the remodeling of the Carriage House, do you remember where we held our meetings? Lots of different places: Montrose Library, University of Houston/College of Engineering, Foley’s Oasis Room at NW Mall, Houston Public Library (Central), Bayland Community Center on Bissonnet, and the Jungman Library on Westheimer. Who remembers the 1997 Virginia Research Seminar at the Judson Robinson Jr Community Center with the Drill team practicing above our meeting room?

Highlights of the ‘middle years’ wouldn’t be complete without mentioning the Re-labeling Project in May/June of 1998. It was thought that it would take ‘months’ to rearrange and label all the books in the Clayton Library – it took less than 7 weeks. CLF members typed and applied two labels to each book. By converting from the Dewey decimal system, Clayton became much more user-friendly and browsable. Books of a particular state are now grouped in three sections by states. Books with applicability to the entire state or books whose subject matter relates to more than one county are shelved first. These are followed by books that relate to single counties, shelved alphabetically by county name. Third in line are the state’s bound periodicals. Books dealing with more than one state, in the USA section, are still in Dewey Decimal order. Family histories are housed separately and alphabetically by the surname of the primary family.

In February 1999 the Clayton staff introduced us to the marker blocks in the microprint area. What a big help when it comes time to return the reel to its proper place in the drawer. And, with the reduced number of staff, fewer reels are being returned to the wrong drawers.

Also in February 1999, Clayton Library Friends was able to purchase a large number of City Directory microfilm. We received a large donation from the Huffington Foundation restricted to be spent toward City Directories – mostly 1890’s era.

In 2000 the Clayton Library Friends received a major addition to the CLF Endowment Fund. In accordance with the wishes of Margaret E. Whiteley, who passed



away in November 1999, a gift of \$108,204 from the Margaret E Whiteley Charitable Trust was added to our Endowment Fund. Margaret was a charter member and served on the CLF Executive Board from 1989 to 1991.

In the August newsletter, we will try to briefly highlight the activities of CLF in the more recent years, and the conversion of the three Clayton family buildings into objects of beauty.
