newest great granddaughter. How fortunate to have four living generations of my family gathered together! During the hours on the road, my mom and I had plenty of time to chat. After something brought it to her mind, my mother began talking about memories of my fatheres career and the different positions he had held. To my surprise, I discovered details I had not previously known. No matter how well we interview our relatives, there will always be more details that can come out later, simply because we have not yet thought of or asked all the questions.

We know how important it is to gather as many family stories as possible while we have the opportunity. Along with recording the living memories of our family members, an often-overlooked but very important task is to record our own stories. As genealogists, we know the sorts of information we wish we had from previous generations. Some of us, myself included, need to stop procrastinating and record our own stories for those to come.

I believe many of us feel overwhelmed at the thought of trying to produce an orderly tome of family lore. We see the published family history books at Clayton and think, There is no way I can do that! + But, you don't have to. You don't have to write a book. Break it down into manageable pieces and don't get bogged down in the formatting details. It doesn't have to be perfect. (All you perfectionists out there, are you paying attention?) Your family will love and cherish your stories in whatever format you choose. even if ites jotting down random memories in a spiral notebook. Funny stories and memorable moments are great, but don't forget that what may seem to you like mundane, everyday detail will also be a treasure, because your descendantsqway of life will likely be much different from your own.

There are many ways to tell your story. Be creative! You can center it around family photos or maps, which are great memory continued on page 2

Now is the time to start recording the story you know best of all . your own! How many of you wish you knew how to utilize Clayton Library more efficiently, or wonder about our book collection, or even embarking on a new strategy for your research?

Education is the key to efficient, thorough, and effective research. Not only is there an expert staff here at the library to help you with your specific research query, but every month, at Clayton we offer different topical lectures to help you with your research. Each month on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturday, at 10:30 am, an orientation to Clayton is offered. This session

includes an overview of beginning genealogy research, plus a virtual tour of the collection, helping you to effectively access the rich resource in your back yard. And dong forget, October is Family History Month filled with presentations and Genealogy After Dark.+

During the first few months of 2014 the Acquisitions Committee has been working closely with the Clayton Library Collection Development Team to purchase materials for the Library. Because we are able to order items as soon as they become available, we have been able to take advantage of some substantial discounts offered by various publishers. We have also been able to complete the purchase of some series where Clayton does not have all the volumes in a set. Some of the items we have purchased recently include:

- Several volumes in the *National Intelligencer Newspaper Abstracts* series, dating from 1852 to 1870
- The latest volume in the New York Settlers of the Beekman Patent series
- Some African-American Burials and Obituaries from Bastrop and Morehouse Parish, Louisiana
- A number of volumes published by the Bracken County Historical Society in Kentucky
- Vital Records for several towns in Maine, including Bridgton, Canaan, Wayne, Castine and Mercer.

We have also finally received all the volumes in the British *Victoria County History* series, and *Sibley's Harvard Graduates*, which we have been anxiously awaiting since ordering them last year.

These books may not be on the shelf by the time the newsletter comes out, but keep watching the New Books shelf at the Library and you will see them begin to appear. # "I can do it all on the Internet."

When teaching a genealogy class for beginners I get at least one person, and frequently several, who tell me they can do ALL their genealogy research on the Internet. Then I have to explain that only the tip of the iceberg is in digital format.

The next step in the class is usually to have them pull up information on the Internet and then I hear whispers of %batcs not right+, %where did they get that information?+ %canct find anything further back than my grandfather, what should I do now?+

Online services, paid subscriptions, and free web sites are very useful to get your foot in the door and begin, but they are limited. Much material can be found in a library, a courthouse, or in old churches.

Clayton Library has much more information than you would imagine. They have not only an entire floor of books from every state in the United States but also some foreign locations. This can still add just a little extra to that growing Pedigree Chart and accompanying Family Group Sheets.

Go upstairs at Clayton Library and be amazed at what you can find. Many years ago I found a microfiche collection that had colonial Massachusetts vital records beginning in 1643. If you are doing Texas research, there are 48 rolls of microfilm on the Nacogdoches Archives, 27 of them are original documents.

If you are still determined to do your research on the computer you can invest several hundred dollars (a year) in commercial subscription services or you can visit Clayton and have free access to at least some of the expensive services. A few of these are: Ancestry, Fold3, World Vital Records, Access Newspaper Archives, History Geo, etc.

I encourage you not to limit your research to just the few records available on your computer screen.

**Editor's note:** If you'ge determined to research online, some of the above mentioned databases that are accessible at the Clayton library may hold some real treasures. For example, this morning Dick Eastman's blog mentioned that Pennsylvania Death Certificates are being put on-line, in stages . at Ancestry.com. Previously only Pennsylvania residents had access to this particular database. %õ many libraries and research centers everywhere provide free access to Ancestry. After three years the records will be moved to the Pennsylvania State Archives website and be free to all.+

So, another reason to spend some time at Clayton doing research. And while you're there, check the shelves to see what newly purchased and donated books will be helpful to your research.


