PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

All my life, I have known that I am a descendant of Pocahontas. Wait, are you laughing at me? I have to admit that it is kind of funny, but this kind of story is very common in families. My grandfather always told it as gospel fact. He was quite proud of his illustrious supposed ancestress. In the innocent days of my beginning genealogy, I blithely set about tracking back to her. (Iom pretty sure I can still hear laughter!) And so it was that in the very beginning I learned that there is a lot of misinformation out there!

I could probably write a whole article just listing common family tales which generally prove to be more along the lines of fairy tales. Along with the % undian Princess,+ there are the % use brothers+ who immigrated to America. (Why is it always *three* brothers?) My grandfather told that one, too. And of course, one of them became wealthy, though unfortunately not my branch.

Things that confer status are favorite family myths. Maybe you were tempted by that coat of arms for your surname which someone generously offered to sell you with a limited-time discount offer. Or perhaps your family was ‰onnected+to European royalty. Mine was. You could just ask my grandfather if he were still around! I had another ancestor in a different family line who used genealogy to try to prove that he was heir to the throne of Spain. Iqn not kidding. Obviously, he was unsuccessful, but it illustrates that elusive tales of status are quite popular, and generally undependable, in family stories.

As entertaining as all these myths can be, the only real value they may have is in encouraging people to get started in genealogy to find out more. Its important for us to help educate these beginners so that they know the importance of verification and documentation. Its up to us to try to set an example of good genealogical research both through mentoring and through our own practices.

Though it may be tempting to accept that seeming breakthrough at face value, we must check and double check, gather as many good sources as possible, and properly document *everything* before

publishing *anything*! Misinformation did not begin with the internet; there is plenty of it in standard published works as well. However, the internet certainly helps to spread it much more quickly. One person posts erroneous information, and dozens of others eagerly accept it and share it as their own. So we must be very careful what we post. Even if corrections are made later, that earlier mistake will still be circulating out there forever!

Fortunately, there are helpful resources at Clayton Library to assist you in learning to properly evaluate and document your sources. You can find a number of books which will guide you in learning more about this subject. Additionally, the library regularly has free classes on this important subject, as well as on many other genealogical topics. One such class is upcoming on November 24. %uthenticity in Genealogical Research+ will help you to identify reliable sources. Call the library or check its ‰vents+page for more information and to register.

In short, proper sources and documentation should be the keystone of our research. As exciting and delightful as a grandfatheros tales can be to a child, it is equally exciting, and much more rewarding, to discover the *truth* of your family story. Happy hunting!

Captain Dave v. The Yankees: The Civil War Blockade on the Texas Coast Speaker: Andrew W Hall

Andy Hall is a native of Galveston and has spent most of his life on the Texas coast. He spent his early working years, beginning while still an undergrad student, in local history museums, including the Texas Maritime Museum in Rockport. Hall holds degrees from the University of Houston Clear Lake and Texas Tech University.



For the last twenty years, Hall has served as a volunteer with the Texas Historical Commission investigating shipwrecks and in 2001 was part of the first group of state marine archaeological stewards appointed in the United States. Hall has worked on numerous marine archaeology projects in Texas, notably from 1995 to 2002 on the Denbigh Project, the most extensive excavation and research program on a Civil War blockade runner in the Gulf of Mexico.

He has authored several books, including *Civil War Blockade Running on the Texas Coast* and *Galveston-Houston Packet: Steamboats on Buffalo Bayou.*

Mr. Hallos blog . *Dead Confederates, A Civil War Era Blog* -- may be found at <u>http://deadconfederates.com/about/</u>. According to his blog site, he is "native-born and lifelong Texan, with some branches of my family here

stretching back to the days of the Republic. All of my family, on both sides and going back half-adozen generations, are Southerners, from Texas, Virginia, Alabama, Georgia, Florida and elsewhere, with a few border state folks from Missouri thrown in for good measure.

love got more Confederate ancestors, both direct and collateral, than love been able to identify and count up so far. Some of them came from slaveholding families. They served in some of the best-known units of the war, including the Eighth Texas Cavalry (Terryos Rangers), the Fourth Texas Infantry in Hoodos Brigade, and Walkeros Greyhounds. In time and geography, their aggregate service spans the entire war, from First Manassas to after Appomattox, from Milleros Cornfield to the Siege of Vicksburg to the boulder-strewn slope of Little Round Top."

There comes a time when resources at the repository where you have been researching are exhausted. Yes, that even happens at Clayton. After searching our books, microprint, periodicals, databases, vertical files, searching and ordering film from FamilySearch.org, searching Ancestry.com, using the plethora of databases that the Houston Public Library subscribes to, plus all your internet searches, you just have to go to the location that you are researching. Actually, this is a cool thing.

So much only exists at the local repository at the location that the family you are researching that does not exist at the non-location library. Often materials such as photographs, newspaper clippings, locally published sources, original documents, oral histories, vertical files, and other locally created materials are housed at local libraries, historical societies, genealogical society libraries, local historiansqhomes, or nooks and crannies only found on home soil.

The Houston Metropolitan Research Center (HMRC) of the Houston Public Library, what I affectionately call ClaytonsqSpecial Collection Sister, is one of these local history repositories. HMRC is located in the historic Julia Ideson Building, the first Houston Public Library building, downtown at 500 McKinney. This collection includes archival, Texas and local history, and special collections components with the primary objective of locating, preserving and making available to researchers the documentary evidence of Houstons history. The varied collections of HMRC include 40,000 Texas and local history books, 4.5 million photographs, 150,000 architectural drawings, 450 oral histories and 8,000 maps. The archival collections focus on non-current records of local groups or individuals who played roles in Houstons development.

Many collections not only from HMRC but other local repositories can be found digitally also. For Houston material, visit the Houston Area Digital Archives <u>http://digital.houstonlibrary.org/</u>. Examples from other areas include the Genealogy Center of the Allen County Public Library (Indiana) offering Allen County specific resources <u>http://www.genealogycenter.info/fwacdb.php.</u>, or the Quincy Public Library (Illinois) that offers a wealth of information from Abraham Lincolnos Quincy connections and Quincyos Underground Railroad, to local records for genealogy research that include digital images of the local newspaper. Much can be found at the local level. To find links to your local library, visit the <u>%ab-Web+</u> website. This website offers links to over 8,000 library webpages from libraries in 148 countries <u>http://www.lib-web.org/</u>

Remember though, ALWAYS start at the Clayton Library! We are waiting to help you!





Public Relations Update --

During the month of August, the Clayton Library Friends Publicity Committee spearheaded an effort to solicit members and the public-at-large to submit family history stories and family mysteries to GENEALOGY ROADSHOW (GR) which is broadcast on the Public Broadcasting System (PBS). GR is always seeking family mysteries and fascinating genealogical stories for upcoming seasons of the popular program. Since GR has never chosen Houston for one of their programs, CLF thought it would be a great idea to spread the word. If enough interesting stories were submitted from the Houston area, GR might be enticed to bring the program to Houston. As a result, a number of stories and mysteries were submitted from the Houston area, and CLF is hopeful that Houston will be chosen for a future season broadcast.

Randy Pace, CLF Director -- Public Relations, sent out over 1,000 emails to individuals in the Houston area about Genealogy Roadshow, and also sent notices to all local genealogical and historical groups asking them to spread the word and publish a notice in their newsletter about the Genealogy Roadshow idea. Tammy Frey and Randy attended several meetings of genealogical societies and other groups, including the Sons of Revolution Chapter, Houston the American Hispanic Genealogical Society, Bav Area Genealogical Society, and Clayton Library Friends where they handed out flyers and requested that people submit their stories. Information about GR was also posted on Eastman's Genealogical Newsletter, the CLF website, and the CLF Facebook page. On Saturday, August 16th, CLF members Sandy Wilbourn, Tammy Frey, and Randy Pace greeted and handed out flyers to 200 visitors to Clayton Library. Tammy created a wonderful, large poster for the event which was placed in the lobby of the library. Information flyers were also available in the library during August.

Part detective story and part emotional journey, GR combines history and science to uncover stories of diverse Americans. Each

story links to a larger community, revealing the rich cultural tapestry of America. "Genealogy Roadshow is an engaging, innovative program that reveals the bigger picture of our nation's past, present and future," said Beth Hoppe, Chief Programming Executive and General Manager of General Audience Programming for PBS. With a diverse mix of stories in each episode, Genealogy Roadshow appeals to Americans interested in learning about their family histories. It also shows that no matter oneqs heritage and background, everyone has a place in history.+

Not only does GR choose interesting stories for their broadcast but they also share those stories on television in a historic venue! There is no more perfect venue than our own historic Clayton House, the centerpiece of the Clayton Library, Center for Genealogical Research, Houston, Texas, which is one of the top genealogical research facilities in the United States! CLF will keep you posted if Houston becomes a site for the program!

During August, Randy Pace also contacted Edel Howlin with the local PBS affiliate and inquired about the possibility of appearing on the radio or Channel 8 to promote Genealogy Roadshow. While scheduling could not be worked out, Edel liked the idea of showcasing the pursuit of someone seeking their family history and how to use Clayton Library in their pursuit. On Wednesday, October 7, she and a cameraman came to Clayton Library and filmed an interview with Susan Kaufman, Manager of Clayton Library, who talked about the collections and resources that are available and general information about how patrons can benefit and use the library in their family history quest. CLF members, Sandy Wilbourn and Randy Pace, were also interviewed and talked about why they began their family history research and about some interesting facts that they had uncovered using the resources at Clayton Library. Be sure to watch Houston PBS Channel 8 and listen to the PBS radio program called "Houston Matters" to catch the interviews about family history research and Clayton Library!

<u> Acquisitions Committee Report</u> –

Again this quarter we have been working closely with Sue Kaufman and the Collection Development Team at the Library. One of the Librarys priorities at this time is to bring its collection forward into the mid twentieth century; whereas before, materials in Claytons collection have tended to stop prior to the 1920/1930 time period. Sue now feels that it is important to begin to acquire records that bring us up to the time of the 1940 census, and the 2nd World War.

With this in mind, Sue asked the Clayton Library Friends to purchase several rolls of Texas City Directories on microfilm, produced by Primary Source Media. Included on the list are the cities of Dallas, Fort Worth, El Paso, Port Arthur, and Waco, from the late-1930s to the mid-1950s. Because of CLF¢ quick turnaround time, we were able to take advantage of Primary Source Media¢ Annual Fall Sale, and purchase the microfilm at a cost of \$42 a roll, instead of the regular cost of \$140 a roll. a real bonus! We also ordered 55 volumes of Illinois and Wisconsin Historical Plat books, as requested by Sue. Again these cover the 1940s and 1950s.

Because the Houston Public Library is on a limited budget, and because many of the books ordered by the Friends are published either in paperback or are spiral bound, we have also donated \$5,000 to the Houston Public Library Foundation, to be used <u>exclusively</u> for binding Clayton Library materials. This means that many of the books ordered by the Friends can be sent to the Bindery immediately after they are cataloged, which greatly improves both their appearance and their shelf life.

We are also still working on the Book for Every County project, so if you happen to be researching in a certain geographic area and notice that we dond have any books on a particular county, please let us know. Of course, we would appreciate it even more if you know of a specific book that has been published that might be available for us to purchase! We are always trying to strengthen Claytons collection in whatever ways we can, so if you have any suggestions, please leave a note at the Library Information Desk.

Gone to Brazil... <u>The Confederados</u>

Is your Confederate ancestor missing from the 1870 Federal Census? Did you assume he died in the Civil War? He may have gone to Brazil!!!

The Clayton Library for Genealogical Research has several resources available for the study of the Confederates in Brazil, as well as Confederates that moved to other South and Central American locations.

After the Civil War, many Confederate soldiers were disgusted with the state of the Union and the devastation of the south. Many of these soldiers moved their families 7,000 miles to Brazil in hopes of starting new lives on new land that had similar soil and climate conditions to the southern states.

The Emperor of Brazil offered land for 25 cents an acre to anyone who wanted to migrate. While General Robert E. Lee implored the Confederates not to abandon the south, it is estimated that ten to twenty thousand people left for South America. They travelled on sailing ships and steamships from New York, Charleston, New Orleans, and Galveston, at great cost and great hardship.

The immigrants from the southern United States raised crops such as cotton, corn, sugar cane, and introduced watermelon and pecans to Brazil. Many of the settlers lived in the small community of Santa Barbara Dopeste which later became known as Americana, and still exists today. For over a century and a half, Americana has celebrated the Confederacy with an annual celebration of southern clothing, southern food, Dixie music and the flying of the rebel flag. There are several graveyards in the area with the graves of confederate soldiers and their families.
