President's Message

Greetings,



After three and a half years of online meetings, CLF returns in person to Clayton Library this month. Our quarterly membership meeting will be held Saturday, August 19 as a hybrid gathering of in-person attendees and online participants via Zoom. Read more about the meeting, its speaker—spoiler alert: it's our beloved Clayton manager, Sue Kaufman—and how to register on page three.

COVID-19 presented many challenges for our world, but the necessity of connecting with one another remotely taught organizations an important lesson: our reach often spans beyond our local area. For the CLF board, we learned Clayton has fans across our region, state, and country who want to engage beyond their visits to 5300 Caroline Street. Hybrid meetings are a way to keep these remote patrons involved. Our city is also a large metropolitan area, and—as the saying goes—"Houston is an hour away from Houston." Hosting hybrid meetings will help locals fit CLF meetings into their busy schedules without a commute.

While having online options is convenient, we must also remember Clayton needs us in person. Just walking through the door shows the Houston Public Library that their patrons care about Clayton and its collection. Each book used (and placed back on the cart for counting), each question asked of a librarian, each program attended -- these metrics matter. Sue Kaufman will present this information on August 19 and share how she and HPL leaders view the state of the library.

Our quarterly meetings will also look a little different as we return in August. CLF meetings will now be held inside Clayton in the Garwood Room. This location's audio/visual equipment makes broadcasting over Zoom easier. Because this space has limited seating, in-person attendees must register online at claytonlibraryfriends.org/events to attend. Online attendance is unlimited but still requires registration to obtain the Zoom link. Our meetings remain free and open to the public.

Each year Clayton Library Friends asks Sue Kaufman, the Senior Manager of Family History Research Center at the Clayton Library Campus, to meet with us and tell us about the Clayton Library events and activities of the past year – and the hopes and desires for the future.

An Illinois native, Sue has more than 30 years of experience as a genealogy librarian. She started her career in Peoria, Illinois (1987), and then moved to the Allen County Public Library in Fort Wayne, Indiana (1999-2004). She then moved to Texas where she became the manager of Clayton Library in 2006.

A presenter at local, state, and national genealogy conferences and meetings, she also has held numerous genealogical society board positions in Illinois, Indiana, and Texas, and at the national level with the Federation of Genealogical Societies.

In 2019, Sue received the National Genealogical Society / ProQuest P. William Filby Award, and became a Fellow of the Texas State Genealogical Society. Both of these honors were for outstanding service as a genealogy librarian and for service to family history researchers. She also received the Lloyd DeWitt Bockstruck Distinguished Service Award from the Dallas Genealogical Society. Sue is past President of the Texas State Genealogical Society, and currently serves as its Director of Education. She is a member of the Texas Library Association and the American Library Association.

Need a scanner?

Recently, my husband and I have been going through our family history photos and documents. It's a great walk down memory lane. Although, I am jealous, his mother identified almost EVERY photo, including the one of what was not her husband yet in his new Navy uniform surrounded by women. The back of that photo reads "Cecil and unknown women" LOL!

Although I do have photos, many of my memories, or new to me images are on slides. But, oh what they have revealed. I now have images of myself when I was a little little, like newborn that I had never seen before. And wow, yep, I was born

with a head of hair that was like a new copper penny. Just like my mother would tell me.

These are memories and images that need to be saved. Yet, as we go through the albatrosses of boxes that fill up spaces in our homes, we wonder what should be passed on, what is important to the family, how much stuff can we realistically keep in physical format, and will our family even want the physical format (photos, slides, documents), so.....how can we pass down what we, as family historians feel is important?

Scan them!!!!!! Scan the photos, scan the slides, scan the documents all at the library for FREE!! The Clayton Library Friends recently purchased a SnapScan system with an image enhancement software called Vivid-Pix. This is a small goose neck overhead scanner that can scan up to 11x17 images.

In addition to the SnapScan, we have a sheet document feeder, a flatbed scanner, and yes, even a slide scanner, and we have slide carousels too, you don't have to worry about not having one of those!

All this equipment is available during the open hours of the library. You can make an appointment to get trained on the machines, either on the third Saturday of each month, or during the week. Just call 832-393-2600 and mention you would like to talk to one of the staff about setting up an appointment.

Throughout the years, Clayton Library Friends has been very generous to the users of the library through funding for purchases of books and materials that help you find your ancestors, technology to record your ancestors, and now ways to preserve your ancestors.

Remember, no one wants the boxes of your stuff. You can put them on a flash drive that you bring when you scan at the library. Not only are you giving your family their family history, but you are also giving it to them in a way that can be easily saved for generations to come.



Liz Hicks: Chief Angel Behind CLF's Angel Program

If you have used a periodical in your family history research at Clayton, one individual likely had a role in getting it on the shelf: Elizabeth "Liz" Nitschke Hicks, coordinator of CLF's Angel Program. Since 1995, this program has significantly expanded Clayton's periodical holdings beyond the library's annual city budget. Liz, the Angel Program's creator, has been its caretaker and champion for over 28 years.

Modeling the program on Austin Genealogical Society's sponsorship of periodicals for the Texas State Library, Liz set a goal of acquiring 10 key publications from seven US states in Fall 1994. She challenged CLF members to "adopt" a publication and pledge the needed amount for an annual subscription. By the end of the first year, 32 publications from nine states were funded by Angel Program donors. These earliest acquisitions included both printed materials and microfilm. Angels also donated funds for back issues of selected periodicals, placing materials from as early as 1960 into Clayton's collection.



Today, CLF donors fund 50 annual subscriptions through the Angel Program. Liz manages the program by ensuring each periodical has funding, that subscriptions are renewed when due, and that the library receives the periodicals in a timely manner. This important job often coincided with other CLF roles Liz held through the years. She served on the CLF Board as President in 2004, 1st Vice President in 1995-96 and 2000-01, 2nd Vice President in 1998, and Director in 2002-03.

Please join us at the August 19 membership meeting where we will recognize Liz and her Angel Program accomplishments. As of June 2023, Liz has decided to hang up her "chief angel" wings and transition management of the Angel Program to CLF members Lynda Collins and Barbara Richards. These members have some big wings to fill.

Thank you, Liz, for your dedicated, faithful service. Your vision for the Angel Program will benefit Clayton patrons for many years to come.
